I again see how God will use this experience for my own development. I have much I can learn here on staff and it will be helpful when I am in Bangladesh eventually.

Finland and Estonia

The time goes by so quickly. We are now beginning our eighth year in the Finland and Estonian Territory. Our previous year in Finland has been another one of discovery and challenge. We are so thankful for the support we receive in so many ways from all of those in our home Territory!

Definitely a highlight this year was BOUNDLESS. We decided to travel Europe by car and so drove to Great Britain and back. With Canadian friends, we visited eleven countries and took thousands of pictures. BOUNDLESS provided opportunity to meet with so many of our Salvation Army family from around the world. We had no idea how large our network has become since living in a Nordic country.

Hannu continues to lead the Porvoo Corps with a very active social services unit and much community contact. The highlight of his week is the Sunday school program at The Salvation Army daycare where he and our puppets share the Word of God with forty 3- and 4-year olds, every Friday. The kids are always so eager to see them!

We will host Pikujoulu (Little Christmas) at the corps in December for the daycare families. Please pray that these families will become connected in a meaningful way with the corps. He has had a few health challenges this year – gall bladder and knee surgery – but nothing that is keeping him down – he plays hockey at least twice weekly.

Gerry's work at the Training College and as the officer responsible for candidates is full and multifaceted. It involves much travel and the organization of many events as well as teaching. Never a dull moment! We have four Messengers of Light who will be commissioned in the near future

- **Grace** as we grow and learn, are challenged and stretched, we are more than ever aware of God's sustaining grace.





Hong Kong and Macau

With the August launch of the Caring Photo Competition the Army has been holding celebration gatherings across the Command which bring together the various streams of service and ministry in a given district to promote 'holistic mission' and encourage cross program integration.



O'Day is comprised of sport, travelling and charity elements, allowing orienteering elite and beginner teams to navigate across the unique historical and cultural spots in Macau, raising funds for the community services of The Salvation Army in Hong Kong and Macau.

Education Program for Children and Youth in Mainland China

The program aims to assist students from low income families to continue their studies and support is given at school level to enhance teaching excellence and quality.

Anti Human Trafficking Activities

To raise public awareness, training activities and seminar workshops were held in Hong Kong for in-depth teaching. A fundraising program, the Helping Hand Project, raised over HK\$31,000 for anti-human trafficking work. Homemade soaps made by former trafficking victims and miniature handmade angels by Salvationists were given to female victims of sex-trafficking as a tangible expression of friendship.

Symposium on Medical-Social Partnership in Promoting Palliative and End-of-life Care in Residential Settings October 10, 2015 World Hospice Day

With funding support by "la Caixa" Foundation and The Bank of East Asia Charitable Foundation, The Salvation Army and the Hong Kong Association of Gerontology launched the "Palliative Care in Residential Care Homes for the Elderly" (or PC Project) in 2010. It provides a new option for the residents of elderly homes to stay in the homes, a familiar environment, in the last stage of their lives. At least 10 elderly homes have joined the project. More than 300 people from medical, social welfare and academic circles took part in the symposium, where care workers and medical partners from four participating elderly homes shared the successful cases and their practical experiences.

It's hard to believe we're now in our third year of ministry in Australia. We're enjoying the challenges and opportunities in ministry and working together with a great team of officers, soldiers and employees.

The day after we returned from our summer furlough, we received word that the Royal Commission into Institutional Response to Child Sexual Abuse would conduct a Case Study considering the Australia Southern territory. During the month of October the Royal Commission carefully reviewed the territory's work with children.

We are grateful for the territory's response to a dark chapter in its history. That response has included a refusal to deny or defend failures of the past, preparedness to respond to survivors today, assisting as many as possible in their journey to healing and wholeness, and doing all that is possible to see this never happens again to any child or vulnerable person.

We count it a privilege to lead the territory at this time. It is a humbling experience to meet one on one with survivors to hear their story first hand and offer a personal and organizational apology.

There are dynamic advances occurring in ministry settings across the territory. Building on a heritage of brass, the territory is opening doors to children and families through a school-based partnership in offering brass music lessons. "Just Brass" is impacting communites, schools, families and corps.

Over the course of the last year an officer couple transitioned from the Territorial Youth Leadership office, to the study and development of a response to emerging generations recognising and creating strategy for Salvation Army Emerging Faith Communities. The offering of a new avenue for short-term full-time service on officer-like conditions as Aux.-Lieutenants has opened new doors for leadership across the territory in a variety of appointments.

We are grateful for prayers and every expression of remembrance and support. We feel the distance at times, but are grateful for the modern technology to assist in staying connected. We continue to see God at work in and through the difficult, as well as the encouraging, and count it a privilege to be partners with him and the Salvos of this Territory.

Bahamas, Turks and Caicos

During the past few months we have bid farewell to Jamaica. Our years there were a unique experience filled with challenges but overflowing with blessings. The country, and especially its people, will always be as their nation anthem says; "Jamaica land we love."

In August we were warmly welcomed to the Bahamas with Turks & Caicos Division. The division has strong social and corps ministries in Nassau; there are also corps and family services ministries located on some of the 'Family Islands'. Travel to all of the Family Islands is by air which makes visiting them costly.

In late September, Hurricane Joaquin devastated several communities on the Southern Family Islands. Many homes were completely destroyed, while others remained flooded weeks later. The Salvation Army has been assisting those affected and is participating in the rebuilding efforts.



Prayer Requests:

Pray for those impacted by Hurricane Joaquin. They need support not only with food and shelter but also to overcome the emotional trauma of the storm and its aftermath.

Pray for our youth ministries; the division needs a Divisional Youth Secretary. It is difficult for the division to hold youth events due to high travel costs. Some youth are struggling with the call to officership.

Pray for resources. We have not been able to visit some of our corps due to the cost of travel.
