Defining the Problem

What is Trafficking in Persons (TIP): A widely accepted definition of TIP has been created by the United Nations. The U.N. defines TIP as: *"The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the exploitation of the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labor or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs."*

The U.N. definition of trafficking in persons can be divided into three parts: acts, the means used to commit those acts, and goals for which those acts are committed. At least one element from each of the three parts of the trafficking definition is required to create a TIP case.

What is Sex Trafficking: Sex trafficking is the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act.

What is Commercial Sexual Exploitation

(CSE): Sexual exploitation entirely, or at least primarily, for financial or other economic interests. The economic interests involved may be monetary or non-monetary (i.e., food, shelter, drugs) but in every case, involve the maximum benefits to the exploiter and an abrogation of basic rights, dignity, autonomy, physical and mental well-being of the persons involved. (R. Estes and N. Weiner, 2001) Distinct yet inter-related elements make up a continuum of abuse in CSE. These include strip-ping, live-sex shows, pornography, prostitution, and trafficking for these purposes.

IMPORTANT POINTS:

- Sex is an integral dimension of the human being, of the self. When it is treated as a thing to be taken, the human being is rendered into a thing, an objectification that not only violates human rights but also destroys human dignity. (K. Barry, p 33)
- The existence of prostitution is the only reason sex trafficking exists. (J. Friedlin quoting D. Hughes)
- [Sexual] trafficking is simply the global form of prostitution. (M. Farley, p xvii)
- Prostitution is sexual exploitation sustained over time. (K. Barry, p 29)
- Sexual trauma is unique from other forms of trauma. It is a violation of the most intimate and personal aspect of the self. One's own body becomes the setting in which the atrocities are perpetrated When an individual has been beaten into submission, has become passive and accepting of what is done to her because she is a captive, then any sexual encounter she has is rape. Even if she has worked hard to attract the customer, because she has no right to refuse consent, she is being raped. (W. Freed, p 138)

Scope of the Problem

A General Overview

Globally:

Twenty-seven million people are enslaved in various forms of sexual and labor exploitation, more than at the height of the trans-atlantic slave trade. (K. Bales)

UNICEF reports that across the world, there are more than one million children entering the sex trade every year and that approximately 30 million children have lost their childhood through sexual exploitation over the past 30 years.

The U.S. Department of State estimates that approximately 800,000 persons — mostly women and children — are trafficked across national borders annually. *[Note: This estimate does not include those trafficked within national borders.]*

Eleven countries score very high as countries of origin for trafficking victims. The countries are Belarus, the Republic of Moldova, the Russian Federation and Ukraine (Commonwealth of Independent States), Albania, Bulgaria, Lithuania, Romania, China, Thailand, and Nigeria. (UNODC, 2006)

India:

More than 2.3 million girls and women were believed to be in the sex industry, and experts believed that more than 200,000 persons were trafficked into, within, or through the country annually. There were approximately three million trafficking victims in the country, and two thousand rescues a year. Women's rights organiza-

tions and NGOs estimated that more than 12,000 and perhaps as many as 50,000 women and children were trafficked into the country annually from neighboring states for commercial sexual exploitation. (U.S. Department of State, 2005)

USA:

In fiscal year 08, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) opened 432 human trafficking investigations, which consisted of 170 investigations of forced labor and 262 investigations of commercial sexual exploitation. ICE made 189 arrests, 128 for crimes involving sexual exploitation and 61 for forced labor. During the same time span, the FBI opened 132 trafficking investigations, made 139 arrests, filed 129 complaints/informations/indictments, and obtained 94 convictions. Note: the FBI does not participate in every human trafficking investigation. (U.S. Department of Justice, 2009)

Despite an estimated prevalence of 100,000 to 150,000 (K. Bales) slaves in the U.S., fewer than 1,700 persons have been "certified" as victims of human trafficking through the efforts of the federal government since 2001, when services for trafficking victims were first made available. (U.S. Department of Justice, 2009)

Demand

Belgium, Germany, Greece, Israel, Italy, Japan, the Netherlands, Thailand, Turkey and the United States are countries ranked “very high” as destination countries of trafficked persons. (UNODC, 2006)

Prostitution in the Philippines is a de facto legal industry that is now the fourth largest source of gross national product (GNP) for the country. 300,000 sex tourists from Japan alone are believed to visit the Philippines every year. (A. Trinidad, 2005)

The sex industry in the Netherlands is estimated to make almost \$1 billion each year. (UNECE, 2004) It is a major Western European destination country for trafficked women with 2000 brothels and numerous escort services, using an estimated 30,000 women. (D. Hughes, 2002) Conservatively, 68-80% of women in its sex industry are from other countries, a factor highly indicative of sex trafficking.

Impact

Foremost among the health risks of prostituting persons is premature death. In a recent US study of almost 2000 prostituting persons followed over a 30-year period, by far the most common causes of death were homicide, suicide, drug- and alcohol-related problems, HIV infection and accidents – in that order. The homicide rate among active female prostitutes was 17 times higher than that of the age-matched general population. (*Canadian Medical Association Journal*, 2004)

89% of 785 people in prostitution from nine countries wanted to escape prostitution. 75% of those in prostitution have been homeless at some point in their lives. 68% of 827 people in several different types of prostitution in 9 countries met criteria for post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). The severity of PTSD symptoms of participants in this study were in the same range as treatment-seeking combat veterans, battered women seeking shelter, rape survivors, and refugees from state-organized torture. (M. Farley, 2003)

Prayer Requests

Rescue and Restoration

Pray for the rescue and restoration of the countless number of people who have become victims of sexual trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, including the following:

- for an end to their exploitation and sexual abuse;
- for as many safe and secure shelters as are needed to provide for their physical needs;
- for loving caretakers to provide comfort, solace, and a sense of family;
- for training and education to provide these persons with meaningful and productive livelihoods;
- for medical treatment to meet their many health concerns;
- for the Gospel message to reach their ears and be received in their hearts.

Breakdown of the Sex Industry

Pray for the breakdown of the sex industry which fuels sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation of persons:

- the demise of the pornography industry;
- a ban on internet pornography and sex tourism internet sites;
- for the closure of strip clubs;
- strong law enforcement efforts the world over to enforce obscenity laws, fight corruption, and to arrest/convict the pimps, traffickers and "customers";
- permanent closure of brothels.

Reduction of Demand

Pray for efforts to reduce the demand for commercial sex, including the following:

- the defeat of attempts to legalize prostitution in countries around the world;
- the overturn of laws that legalized prostitution in the Netherlands, Germany, New Zealand and certain districts of Australia;
- for the repeal of legalized in-door prostitution in Rhode Island, and the repeal of legalized prostitution in portions of Nevada;
- for the development in programs known as "johns' schools" for men convicted of soliciting for sex (aimed at educating men about the harms of prostitution);
- for the success and development of additional ministries such as "Faithful and True" and "Avenue" which help people plagued with sexual addictions;
- for counter-cultural movements opposing the normalization of pimping and prostitution;

- for God to convict the hearts of traffickers, pimps and the “customers” and to transform their lives, as in the example of John Newton who turned from his life as a slave trader after coming to the faith.

Development

Pray for the development of impoverished nations so that the peoples in such countries may know a decent standard of living, have meaningful education and employment opportunities, and thus escape the desperate circumstances that make people vulnerable to commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking.

World Leaders

Pray for world leaders, that they will confront sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation by dedicating their time and energy and national resources to eradicating it.

The Church

Pray for the church and its response to sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, including the following:

- for more Christian aid workers to establish and administer recovery homes for survivors of trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, as well as programs to rescue victims;
- for the church, its members and leaders, to remain sexually pure — that they not become the perpetrators or consumers of abuse in any form;
- for increased networking and cooperation among Christian groups working on this issue;
- for the strength, fortitude, and vision of Christians working to address this issue.

The General and the World President of Women’s Ministries call the worldwide Salvation Army to a weekend of prayer for the victims of sex trade trafficking.
