Reserve 107: Reconciliation on the Prairies

directed by Brad Leitch; Adrienne Leitch

For decades, stories have spread throughout the village of Laird, Saskatchewan. The First Nations that came to the town, starting in the 1970s, insisted that a treaty signed between their people and the Government of Canada states the land actually belongs to an indigenous first nation. When a group of Mennonites and Lutherans in the town of Laird discover that the land they live on is in fact the former reserve of the Young Chippewyan First Nation, they are forced to acknowledge their history. Myths, assumptions and fears are shattered as this old injustice is about to provide an opportunity for friendship and renew a fierce determination to repair the wrongs of the past.



The Doctrine of Discovery: Unmasking The Domination Code

As a result of the collaborative efforts by filmmaker and Director Sheldon Wolfchild and Co-Producer Steven Newcomb, this documentary, based on Newcomb's thirty years of research, and his book *Pagans in the Promised Land: Decoding the Doctrine of Christian Discovery*, brings to the big screen the amazing and little known story: that of the original nations, whose land title is still to this day ruled by U.S. Supreme Court as a "mere right of occupancy" subject to a right of domination on the part of the United States as the first "Christian people" that claimed "ultimate dominion" over lands inhabited by non-Christians.

In *Wrongs to Rights*, over 40 authors from diverse backgrounds – Indigenous and Settler, Christian and Traditional – wrestle with the meaning of the *Declaration* for the Church. With a firm hold on past and present colonialism, the authors tackle key questions that the *Declaration* and the TRC's call to “adopt and comply” raises: What are its potential implications? How does it connect to Scripture? Can it facilitate genuine decolonization, or is “rights talk” another form of imperialism? And what about real life relationships? Can the *Declaration* be lived out – collectively and personally – on the ground?



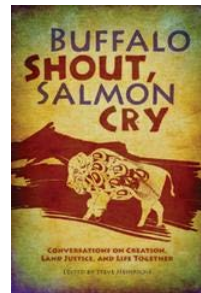

Essays on land use, creation, history, and faith appear among poems and reflections by people across ethnic and religious divides. The writers do not always agree in fact, some are bound to raise readers' defenses. But they represent the hard truths that we must hear before reconciliation can come.

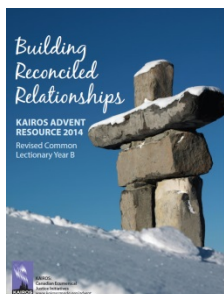
What can we do?

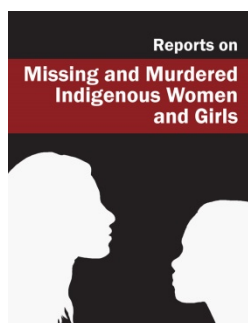

The future must include honouring Indigenous rights and building and renewing nation-to-nation relationships.

This booklet is designed to help non-Indigenous communities begin on a path of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. By learning and unlearning. By building relationships. By actively practicing reconciliation. By living out our commitment in worship, in prayer and in just action. KAIROS is with you on this journey, as together we strive to practice reconciliation.

The KAIROS Blanket Exercise, with versions for youth and adults, is a hands-on way to explore the nation-to-nation relationship with Indigenous peoples in Canada, to work toward reconciliation, and to empower people to build bridges of understanding and respect. Created in 1997, the Blanket Exercise is a succinct overview of Indigenous history and rights that explores the major themes and findings of the 1996 Report of the *Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples* (RCAP).



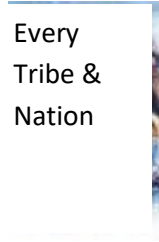
