#### PHYU CHILDREN'S HOME By Major Heather Matondo

hyu Children's Home in Myanmar currently supports 26 boys between the ages of eight and 17, providing all their daily essentials, from nutrition and education to health care.

The main source of water for the home is an onsite water tank, which supplies clean water for washing, cooking, bathing, and more.

Thomas Fuller once said, "You never know the worth of water until the well is dry." This is something the home did not want to experience. When the staff noticed that the wooden structure holding the tank was becoming worn and at risk of collapsing, they acted quickly to find a solution.

The Brighter Futures Children's Sponsorship Program worked alongside the Singapore, Malaysia and Myanmar Territory to replace the wooden structure with a more solid and secure concrete one. After just a few months of work, the project was completed, and the children and staff at the home are delighted to know that their water supply is now protected for years to come.

This is just one of the many ways Brighter Futures ensures that children and youth around the world have all their daily needs met, including access to a clean, safe water source.

#### **SUPPORT EDUCATION IN LIBERIA:**

## **Rebuild Albert Orsborn Primary School for Children in Surrounding Communities**

n February 14, 2023, at approximately 5 a.m., a fire destroyed The Salvation Army's Albert Orsborn Primary School in Liberia. Established in 2001, the school had provided a safe and engaging learning environment for 108 students aged 2 to 12 years in Kakata, Margibi County. With six classrooms, each averaging 18 pupils, the school operated at full capacity and often had to turn away new students due to space limitations.

For years, the semi-permanent structure served as a secure space for education. However, the fire—possibly caused by a lightning strike—altered everything.

The director of education for The Salvation Army in Liberia and staff acted swiftly, rallying parents and resources. Within six days, classes resumed in makeshift classrooms at a local Salvation Army church. Of the 108 students enrolled before the fire, only 79 returned.

In collaboration with the community, including the Albert Orsborn Parent-Teacher Association, The Salvation Army is proposing the reconstruction of the Albert Orsborn School. The new facility will support students from kindergarten through Grade 6, with plans to accommodate 200 students, averaging 20 per classroom.

#### **RISING TIDES, RISING HOPE**

he relentless downpour of monsoon rains has created a humanitarian crisis in Pakistan as certain communities struggle with the aftermath of unprecedented flooding, widespread devastation and loss of life. In Balochistan, 77 people have died, including women and children, and more than 100 others have been injured.

The situation in Quetta has reached a critical point, prompting a state of emergency for 150,000 people in urgent need of humanitarian aid, with 30,000 facing dire circumstances. Floodwaters have submerged hospitals in Muslim Bagh and cut off essential routes in Qila Saifullah, Zhob and Harnai, severely hindering rescue efforts. In Pishin, the sight of hundreds of homes washed away underscores the urgent need for immediate assistance.

During the critical period from July to September 2022, The Salvation Army played a pivotal role in providing essential aid to affected families. Food, clean water, hygiene kits, and household items were distributed to 500 families, benefiting nearly 3,000 individuals.

The Salvation Army observed families determined to rebuild, with children remaining hopeful, parents expressing deep gratitude for the supplies, and elders demonstrating remarkable strength and appreciation in every interaction.

The Salvation Army's team worked closely with local government agencies and community leaders to ensure the aid reached those most in need. The mission in Umeedabad, Peshawar, aimed to provide immediate relief, restore a sense of dignity and build community support despite financial constraints. This effort highlighted the critical importance of co-ordinated relief and community solidarity.

Heartfelt thanks go out to all who contributed, making a significant difference in the lives of the residents.

An estimated 3.7 million people have been internally displaced within Ukraine so far, according to UNHCR. The Salvation Army continues to serve the community in this time of need by providing practical support, positivity and love. This is made possible with your generous support.
