1. What is modern slavery and human trafficking (MSHT)?

MSHT is when a person in manipulated, controlled and forced into sex and labour trafficking, forced marriage and other forms of trafficking and exploitation.

It is estimated that:

- 17,000 people are living in slavery in Canada.¹
- 93% of sex trafficking victims in Canada were born here.²
- Indigenous people, who make up 4.3% of the population, represent over 50% of sex trafficking victims.³

3. Who is vulnerable?

Traffickers will target individuals who are easier to exploit, including those who are:

- · Experiencing poverty or homelessness.
- Young, female, or Indigenous.
- · Lacking an education.
- · Without family or community support.
- · Struggling with addiction and mental health issues.
- Processing a history of family trauma.

4. What are some examples of human trafficking situations?

- An older boyfriend pressuring a girl to sell herself "just this once".
- A migrant worker being exploited through long hours, poor pay and inadequate housing.
- A restaurant employee working in unsafe conditions, deprived of his passport and threatened with harm to his family if he reports or quits.
- A woman goes missing, being moved across the country and forced into prostitution.

5. How do traffickers recruit victims?

Traffickers gain control through:

- Force: Violence, kidnapping, use of restraints or drugs.
- Fraud: Deception through false job offers or compensation and fake social media profiles.
- Coercion: Physical or psychological threats to the individual or their loved ones.
