## History of Gift Wrap

Gifts have been wrapped since the invention of paper in 105 A.D. in China. The paper-making process was kept a secret by the Chinese for centuries, but by 800 A.D. the process was known in Egypt. The secret spread to Europe, where the first paper mill was started in 1085.

Wallpaper, first made in England in 1509, was the forerunner of gift wrap and was used briefly, but it cracked and tore when folded. By the early 20th century, gifts were wrapped in plain brown paper or tissue.


America's gift wrap industry had humble beginnings in Hallmark founder Joyce C. Hall's downtown Kansas City, Mo., store in the early 20th century. Hall is known for being the founder of the greeting card industry, but he can also be credited with the "invention" of presentday gift wrap. Hallmark's launch of printed gift wrap came about almost by accident.

to wrap holiday packages. Some decorative envelope lining papers from France were brought from the manufacturing plant and put on top of a showcase, for 10 cents a sheet, and they sold quickly. The next year, the sheets were offered three for 25 cents and they again sold out. Soon gift wrap became the first product Hallmark made that was a departure from greeting cards.

In the 1930s, Hallmark introduced Hall Sheen ribbon, the shiny kind that sticks to itself when licked like a stamp. It's still the company's most popular ribbon, even after all those years.

Hallmark introduced jumbo plastic gift bags for large items in the 1970s, paper gift bags with handles in 1987, and curl cascade ribbons in 1994.
Before Christmas in 1917, the Hall Brothers' store had sold out of the white, red and green tissue and the one holly pattern being used

Today, Hallmark is the leader of the gift wrap industry.

Gift Wrapping Ideas: These can be printed on a sheet and given to the ladies and perhaps the group may have other suggestions - For an elegant package start with gold foil wrapping paper. Set off the gold with a fabulous topper made of small evergreen twigs and holly berries, or a 2" grapevine wreath with miniature pinecones. Place the arrangement in a large box and lightly spray with artificial snow or glitter, then tie it onto your package with elegant burgundy ribbon. Heavy kitchen foil can be used in place of the gold foil.

- Giving a cookbook to someone for Christmas? Wrap it in a tea towel. Tie the package up with colorful ribbon and add some measuring spoons to the bow. Practically any kitchen gift can be wrapped in tea towels, dish cloths, table cloths or put into decorative tins.

- If using heavy kitchen foil, either wrap the gift straight in the foil, or you can scrunch the foil up to create an interesting effect and then wrap the gift. Add some green, red, or gold ribbon. Why not tie a personalized Christmas Ornament to the bow?

- Use ordinary brown wrapping paper (or clean, paper grocery bags), With a festive rubber stamp, stamp all over the non-shiny side with black ink. Then using a metallic pen (red, green, gold, silver, purple or blue), add little squiggles. Tie with metallic ribbon.
- Tie tinsel around a package instead of ribbon, or you can use raffia and string if you want a natural look to your gift.
- Pack Christmas baking into decorative tins, purchased at the dollar store. Line the tins with waxed paper, add your baking, put on the lid and tie it up with pretty ribbon. How about adding a recipe card and measuring spoons to the bow?
- Give your gift an antique look by using old books of poetry, sheet music or beautiful illustrations from resources that are no longer needed. Carefully separate pages from their binding, to wrap your tiny treasures in.
- Use tulle when you can. Buy tulle either by the yard or as ribbons in various colors (tulle is much cheaper than regular wrapping paper). To wrap, simply place item or items in the center of a piece cut large enough to cover all items with approx. 5"-6" as selvage. Gather all the fabric to the top and tie with a scrap piece of tulle or ribbon. Remember that you will be able to see through the tulle, but that's OK!
- Bag it. Purchase decorative bags at the dollar store. Tie various lengths of colorful ribbon to the handle to close the bag.
- Put it in a basket or box. The dollar stores have a great selection of pretty holiday baskets and decorative trinket boxes. All you need is a little see-through wrapping and a colorful bow with wisps of ribbons hanging down.

## Meditation: The Gift Goes On

## Story: 3 Wise Women

Do you know what would have happened if it had been Three Wise Women instead of Three Wise Men? They would have asked directions, arrived on time, helped deliver the baby, cleaned the stable, made a casserole and brought practical gifts.

The Wise Men who visited the infant Christ child understood the idea of gift giving. Their gifts were chosen carefully because of their symbolism.

## What they tell us in their gifts.

They brought GOLD — Sign of Royalty

They offered FRANKINCENSE

- A specific tree sap, dried, ground, and burned as part of their worship service.

They presented MYRRH - A different tree sap, used for relieving pain and embalming at the time of death.

What might these three gifts symbolize for us?
The Wise Men brought gold, and confessed
their acceptance of His kingship.
They brought frankincense and admitted their recognition of Jesus as being worthy of their worship.

They brought spices (myrrh) of suffering and death, predicting that this royal king, worthy of worship, would be rejected, would die.

These gifts represented Jesus in three ways, as King, as Lord, as Saviour. They knew that this baby was unlike any other and it was this knowledge that encouraged them to give the very best that the world had to offer. What

of love. He gave His very best, His only Son.

Many people today celebrate the coming of this gift but they do not know the reality of God's presence in their lives. They get caught up in the celebration but they have not unwrapped the message of salvation and all that it encompasses. Only those who have accepted and experienced the gift can truly know the joy and excitement that comes from a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. A joy that continues, even when the Christmas season is over. It's a gift that keeps on giving!
